God's Appointed Feasts - Week 11 Jesus' Birthday - Feast of Tabernacles?

Luke 1:5

## 1. Pagan Celebration of the birthday of a god -

- Ancient Egyptians, Greeks, and Romans celebrated the "birthdays" of their gods -
- If the king or Pharaoh identified as a "god," the king would celebrate the god's birthday.


## 2. December $25^{\text {th }}$ ?

- Most cultures had winter solstice celebrations to celebrate the resurgence of the sun or sun god.
- Example: Sol Invictus
- Constantine Chlorus (250-306 AD) was identified as Mithras incarnate.
- The god Mithras was said to be born on December 25.
- Constantine (272-337 AD) - reigned as the first Caesar to convert to Christianity.
- December $25^{\text {th }}$ was formally celebrated as the birth of Jesus in 336 AD.

3. The Bible does not tell us the date of Jesus' birth:

- Scholars know that it is not December $25^{\text {th }}$.
- Clues can be derived from a close reading of Luke.


## 4. The Priestly Division of Abijah -

- Luke 1:5 - belonging to the "priestly division of Abijah."
- 1 Chronicles 24:10 -
- There were too many priests to serve in the Temple continually.
- They were divided up into 24 divisions (or courses or brigades).
- During Passover and Feast of Tabernacles - all divisions served for two weeks.
- During the remainder of the year, each division would serve for one week according to their order. Abijah was the eighth.



## 5. Elizabeth is Pregnant -

- Luke 1:24 - "soon after" Elizabeth becomes pregnant.
- Assume that by July $1^{\text {st }}$, Elizabeth is pregnant.
- Luke 1:24 - "five months in seclusion."

## 8. Shepherds living in the Fields - Luke 2:8-

- The barley and wheat harvest runs from April to the end of July.
- The majority of the year, shepherds and their sheep live in the wilderness (desert).
- After the harvest, the shepherds bring their sheep up from the wilderness into the "fields." They live in the "fields" through October.
- By November (early rains), the shepherds are back in the wilderness, and the farmers are preparing their fields for planting in December.


## 9. God is coordinated:

- Hanukkah - a festival of lights. Is it possible that Jesus - the "light of the world," was conceived during the festival of lights?
- Festival of Tabernacles -
- Celebration of light when the "light of the world" was born.
- Celebration of living water when the "living water" was born.
- The chant of Hoshanah - "Save Now!" - and God sends his salvation - Yesbua- into the world.
- Passover - Jews are expecting Elijah to show up at Passover.
- John the Baptist is Elijah come again, ushering in the Messiah.
- Luke 1:17 - "in the spirit and power of Elijah."
